We are firm believers in promoting community wellbeing which the organisers have been enforcing since their first festival in 1981."

The radio truck has been host to many superstars including Kylie Minogue and popular 90's bands Steps and 5ive, and for a limited time only, the Mersea Island Festival goers will have the chance to discover their inner diva.

Matt Eaves, from Chelmsford Community Radio explained: "We can't wait to get involved; the broadcasting truck will be a wonderful opportunity for the young people attending. They will have the chance to spin the decks, play their favourite tunes, create their own radio shows and have a good old dance! There are important skills to be learned, from communicating through to team work, and even if an individual doesn't want to create, they can enjoy the buzz of excitement we hope to make."

Tom Brennan, Chair of the Mersea Island Festival Trust said: "There's not many places a wheelchair user can go up a climbing wall and then down a zip wire, although if that doesn't take their fancy, then visitors can have a go at African drumming, paintballing or even quad-biking. It's often mentioned that visitors are presented new and exciting opportunities that perhaps they wouldn't normally have at other events."

"As promoters of community wellbeing we are delighted that ECL, the Care & Wellbeing Company, will be supporting this year's festival. We are hoping that the radio stage will add an extra bit of excitement and are so pleased that CCR are also on board."

The festival, which has been an annual celebration since 1981, brings together young people and adults from across the community, giving them the chance to experience the fun of the outdoors regardless of disability. The activities aim to challenge and stimulate, but most importantly the festival focuses on increasing confidence and improving each individuals overall wellbeing.
